



**Media Statement – Update on Miller Crossing Long Term Care Home – Edmonton

Alberta Health Services has confirmed that 68 residents of Miller Crossing Long Term Care Home in Edmonton have tested positive for COVID-19 since the outbreak was declared on December 7, 2020. Forty-four of these resident cases have resolved. We regret to confirm that 24 residents have passed away with COVID-19 during the outbreak. The team at Miller Crossing offers its most sincere condolences to the families and friends of the residents who passed away.

Alberta Health Services also confirmed that 46 staff members have tested positive for COVID-19. All of these cases have now resolved.

We are working closely with Alberta Health Services officials to maintain pandemic outbreak protocols and infection control practices. We are doing enhanced cleaning at Miller Crossing, frequently disinfecting high touch surfaces like handrails and doors, common areas and staff rooms.

Staff are screened at the beginning and end of their shifts. All staff are required to wear an appropriate mask and eye protection while in the home.

All residents are monitored closely for symptoms twice daily and are tested if they present any potential signs or symptoms of the virus. To maintain stimulation and social engagement for residents in isolation, individual recreation activities continue.

Residents who consented to and were eligible to be vaccinated have received their second dose. Vaccinations for staff are ongoing.

We are regularly updating residents, their families and the staff on the status of the outbreak. Visits are restricted to essential visits for palliative residents.

We recognize how difficult these measures are for residents and their families and we appreciate their patience and understanding as we put these precautions in place for the safety of our residents.

Revera continues to do everything we can to keep our residents and employees safe as we work to prevent the spread of COVID-19 at our long term care homes and retirement residences.
